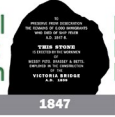

## MONTREAL IRISH MONUMENT PARK

### Notes from the President

Our project is to build a world-class memorial park and cultural green space at the Montreal side of Victoria Bridge, around the Black Rock.

**The Black Rock** was installed in 1859 by the builders of the bridge. It honors the approximately 6,000 Irish immigrants that died of typhus, also known as ship's fever.

Many people do not realize that when they commute over the Victoria Bridge that **they are actually driving over a massive graveyard**. We feel that more should be done to honor the site and the those who call it their final resting place. We hope to involve all levels of Government, as well as Corporate, and individual donors, to build a commemorative space on the site.

### Did you know?

The Black Rock Monument is the **oldest monument** to the Great Hunger (Irish famine) in the world.

The Rock protects and marks **largest famine grave of Irish citizens** outside of Ireland

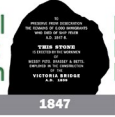
The Rock sits over the **largest mass grave in Canada**.











# Project Updates

## BLACK ROCK LAND DONATED TO THE FOUNDATION BY THE ANGLICAN DIOCESE

Bishop Mary Irwin-Gibson, bishop of the Anglican Diocese of Montreal, announces the **official transfer of the property title of the land housing the historic monument of the Black Rock** to the Irish Monument Park Foundation of Montreal.

On October 18, 2023 The Anglican Church officially donated the plot of land on which the Black Rock monument rests to the Irish Monument Park Foundation of Montreal. The Anglican Church has owned this plot of land, approximately 734 square meters in size, since 1870. This property is a key element in the creation of a commemorative park in honor of those buried at this historic site, which is located atop the largest mass grave in Canada.

Bishop Mary Irwin-Gibson of the Anglican Diocese of Montreal and Fergus Keyes, President of the Irish Monument Park Foundation of Montreal, stated:

"We are deeply grateful to Bishop Irwin-Gibson and the Anglican Diocese for this generous donation," said Fergus Keyes, president of the Irish Monument Park Foundation of Montreal. "This gesture represents an important step in the process of creating an appropriate facility – memorial space around the Black Rock that will reflect the historical significance of the site, not only for Montreal's Irish community but for the entire city."



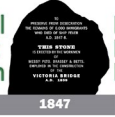

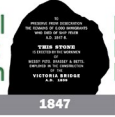
## \$1 MILLION FUNDRAISING GOAL FOR THE FIRST YEAR ACHIEVED!

## Connecting the dots of the Irish diaspora

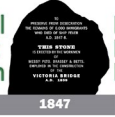

## WE'VE MOVED INTO OUR NEW DOWNTOWN OFFICE AT THE HISTORIC FORGET HOUSE

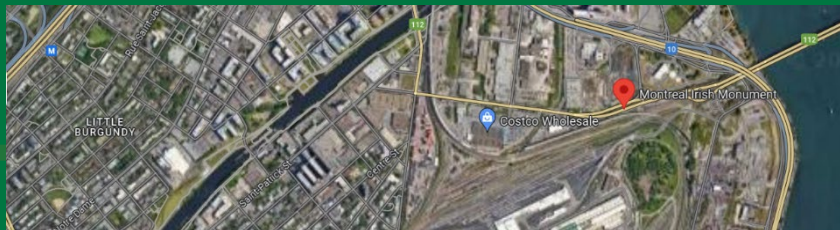

## OFFICIAL LAND TRANSFER SET FOR AUTUMN 2024

Upon the completion of their new substation "Des Irlandais", our partner Hydro-Québec is set to officially donate roughly 15 000m<sup>2</sup> of land to the foundation to build Black Rock the commemorative site. With this final transfer of land, a very considerate gesture from the company, members of the Montreal Irish community will, for the first time, own a significant portion of the 1847 cemetery under and around the Black Rock. 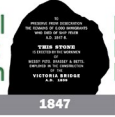

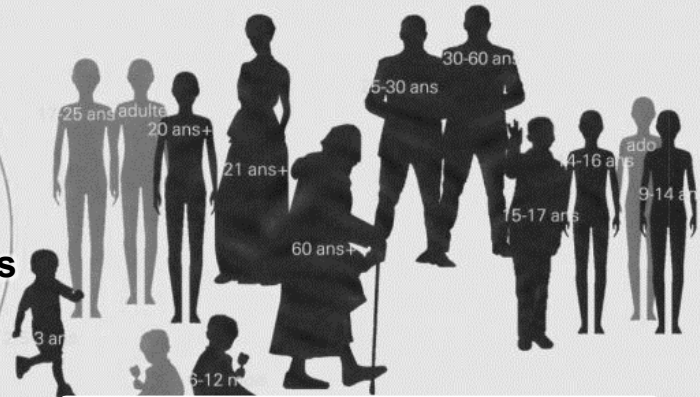






# WHO ARE THEY?

The remains of 14 individuals  
excavated by REM archaeologists



In November 2019, a team of archaeologists embarked on an excavation at the Black Rock cemetery site. Their mission was prompted by the need to install a REM (Réseau express métropolitain) pillar, which was suspected to intersect with the cemetery grounds. Demonstrating a commitment to responsible development, the company collaborated with the Irish Montreal community to finance the dig and ensure respectful handling of any human remains discovered.

**This endeavor marked the first official archaeological effort at the site.** Lead archaeologist Martin Perron emphasized the historical significance, noting that prior to this excavation, the only analyzed human remains of Irish migrants in Quebec were those of eighteen individuals found at Cap-des-Rosiers, identified as castaways from the Carricks shipwreck.

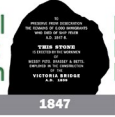
The inscription on the Black Rock Monument estimates that 6000 Irish refugees were buried in the cemetery, yet the identities and stories of those interred remained largely veiled in mystery until now.

Through the excavation of a cylindrical hole measuring 7m<sup>2</sup>, the team unearthed the remains of 14 individuals laid to rest in white pine coffins. Among them were seven adults, including two men and two women, three teenagers, and four children.

For further insights into these individuals, including details about childhood diet and prevalent ailments, readers are encouraged to explore our website. Particularly poignant are the stories of a 12-24 month old infant and a young boy with a disability in his right leg. It's poignant to reflect on the arduous journeys these individuals endured—from their homes to the coffin ships, mostly on foot, surviving months of hardship aboard overcrowded and disease-ridden vessels, only to succumb to illness on foreign shores.

Yet, it is in honoring the memory of these refugees that the foundation endeavors to ensure this site, their final resting place, receives the dignified commemoration it deserves.





# LAB TESTING REMAINS

## Stay tuned for DNA testing information on remains

The remains excavated by REM archaeologists were subsequently sent to a laboratory for testing purposes. We did receive a note from them the remains were fairly well preserved and that DNA can likely be obtained for all or most of these remains. The hope is that the DNA will provide information such as the gender of the victim; the approximate age; the cause of death (likely typhus or malnutrition or a combination); the diet of the victims over time (likely potatoes, corn etc.); confirmation that these remains were Irish and from the 1847 event (almost for sure but still testing is required) and similar information that will help to build a profile of each victim.

Advances in DNA and the information that it can yield are happening everyday. This is all quite exciting especially since after more than a decade of searching we have never been able to find any record of the names etc. of the 6000+ victims that died and were buried in the area in 1847. And although 14 out of 6000+ is a small number, they could provide at least some representation of all the victims.

The plan is after all the testing etc. has been completed, these remains will be reburied near the Black Rock in the most dignified manner possible.

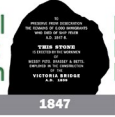
## IRISH GOVERNMENT SUPPORT

### GENEROUS \$200,000 DONATION FROM THE IRISH GOVERNMENT

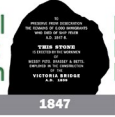

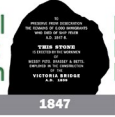

## Meet our Members - Leaders in the Montreal Irish Community



**Danny Doyle | President, The Erin Sports Association, Past-president United Irish Societies**

Daniel "Danny" Doyle, Chief Reviewing Officer of the 2012 188th St. Patrick's Parade, epitomizes the rich Irish-Montreal heritage, rooted in strong family bonds and unwavering community dedication. Hailing from Griffintown, Danny inherited a legacy of service from his father, continuing the tradition through his active involvement in various community endeavors, notably as an integral member of St. Ann's marching unit and as host of the annual post-parade gathering. With over four decades of service at the Canadian National Railway, Danny's retirement in 2021 marked a new chapter in his lifelong commitment to philanthropy, echoed by his wife Catherine and three sons. Danny's extensive volunteer portfolio spans from his early days as an altar boy to his recent tenure as President of the Erin Sports Association and the United Irish Societies, embodying the spirit of service and camaraderie cherished by Montreal's Irish diaspora.

**Ken Quinn | Immediate Past-president, St. Patrick's Society of Montreal, Past-president, United Irish Societies of Montreal**

Ken, honored as Irishman of the Year for his sustained community volunteerism, has deep roots in Montreal's Irish community. His involvement spans organizations like the United Irish Societies and St. Patrick's Society, where he held leadership roles including President. Additionally, he serves as historian for the United Irish Societies. Professionally, Ken is an Asset Analyst at Future Electronics, showcasing his dedication both in his career and community. He's also been recognized for his contributions to NDG Minor Baseball, displaying his commitment to youth development. Beyond this, he's a member of various organizations, including the Innisfail Social and Sports Club, Royal Canadian Legion Branch #4, and the Montreal Irish Monument Park Foundation.



**Dr. Jane McGaughey | Associate Professor & Johnson Chair in Quebec and Canadian Irish Studies, School of Irish Studies, Concordia University**

Jane G. V. McGaughey holds the Johnson Chair of Québec and Canadian Irish Studies until 2026. She began her tenure at Concordia's School of Irish Studies in 2012 as an Assistant Professor focusing on Irish Diaspora Studies. McGaughey earned her Ph.D. from Birkbeck College, University of London in 2008. Her latest book, "Violent Loyalties: Manliness, Migration, and the Irish in Canada, 1798-1841," came out in 2020, exploring Irish male migration to Canada and challenging stereotypes. Before joining Concordia, McGaughey taught at the Royal Military College of Canada and was a National Endowment for the Humanities Faculty Fellow at the University of Notre Dame. Since 2022, she has hosted "The Irish in Canada" podcast, delving into the lives of Irish immigrants and their descendants, with the third season set to debut in March 2024. Episodes are available on various platforms and the podcast's website.



**Paul Dunne | President, Ireland-Canadian Chamber of Commerce, Past-president, St. Patrick's Society of Montreal**

A Fellow of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Ireland and a Canadian CPA, Paul Dunne has been a Montreal resident since the late 1970s. After working briefly as controller of a real estate development company, he joined Alcan Aluminium Limited in Montreal initially in charge of global consolidation of the financial results and later as manager of financial planning for the Alcan group. He taught advanced accounting in the CA program in McGill University for ten years and guest-lectured in the MBA programs in McGill, Concordia and HEC. After leaving Alcan, Paul joined Domfoam International as CFO. In 1994, he left to found Eircan (now JPDO), an independent accounting firm providing cloud-based support to small businesses.

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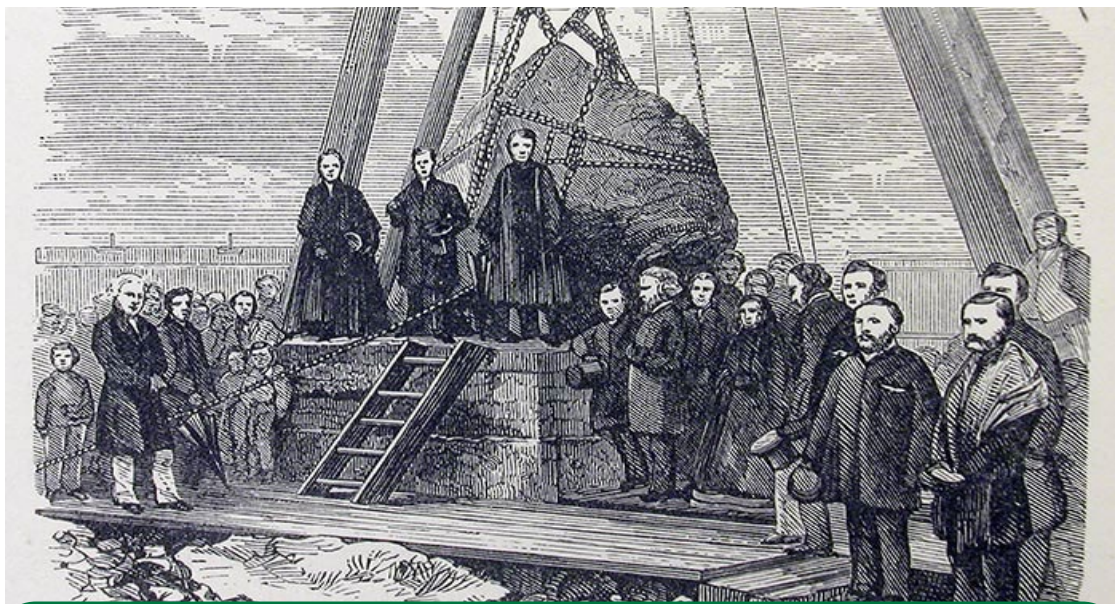
