On September 6 & 7 , 2025, the Montreal Irish Monument hosted a historical panel and commemorative mass at the iconic **Notre-Dame-de-Bonsecours Chapel** in collaboration with the **Site Hitorique Marguerite Bourgeoys**. The event sold out, with guests in attendance including descendants, supporters, and experts who offered moving presentations on the tragedy of the Great Famine of 1847 in Montreal.

Ancient *DNA* Research Moves Forward



Our latest **ancient DNA feasibility study** is now officially underway with **Paleo-DNA** Services at **Lakehead University** in Thunder Bay.

We sincerely thank Dr. Milot and his team at the Université de Montréal à Trois-Rivières for their valuable early work with the recovered remains. As our research progressed, it became clear that the next phase required the highly specialized methods used for ancient and degraded DNA, and the facility at Lakehead is particularly well-equipped for this type of sensitive analysis.


This new study represents an important next step in our ongoing effort to learn more about the 14 individuals from 1847 whose remains were discovered near the Black Rock in 2019 during REM construction. Above all, this work is being carried out with the utmost respect and care for those we are seeking to honour.

While results are expected in the coming months, this stage marks a meaningful moment in our shared journey of discovery and remembrance—deepening our understanding of Montreal's history and the lives of the Irish Famine victims who became part of it.

Goose Village Remembered: History & Archaeology

Irish Night on the Hill



The Irish Night on the Hill was held on **Wednesday, November 19**, in Ottawa at the historic Sir John A. Macdonald Building, located across from Parliament. Approximately **700 guests** attended the event, hosted by the **Embassy of Ireland** and the **Government of Canada**.

The evening was expertly emceed by **James Maloney**, MP for Etobicoke–Lakeshore, who recently committed to supporting the Montreal Irish Monument through participation on our **Government Advisory Committee**.

During the evening, we had the opportunity to speak with Irish Ambassador John Concannon, Steven Guilbeault, then Minister of Canadian Heritage and Peter Burke, Irish Minister for Enterprise, Tourism and Employment. We discussed the Montreal Irish Monument project, with the Ambassador emphasizing its importance to both Canada and Ireland.



Many leaders from the Montreal Irish community were also in attendance, including Lori Morrison, President of the United Irish Societies, and her husband Gregg, Danny Doyle Sr., President of the Erin Sports Association, and his wife Cathy and Bryan O'Gallagher, Honorary Irish Consul for Quebec. Bryan has recently agreed to support the Montreal Irish Monument by joining our newly convened Steering Committee in preparation for our fundraising campaign, set to launch in May 2026.

Notably, the Montreal Irish Monument was the **only specific project in Canada** mentioned by both Minister Burke and MP Maloney during their remarks — making it

a particularly strong evening of recognition for our Foundation.
